## **'Postpone** pay plan for guards'

Companies dismayed over guards' minimum wage proposal, says association

**KUALA LUMPUR: Security** guard companies want the Government to postpone the implementation of minimum wage for security guards to Jan

The Security Services Association of Malaysia said the July 1 date was too soon.

Its president Datuk Shaheen Mirza Habib said security guards' new salaries of RM1,100 to RM1,450 announced by Human Resources Minister Datuk Dr S. Subramaniam had Give us time: Shaheen sent "shock waves through the claims salary revision might Awards presentation, he reitindustry".

"The notice is too short for business. our members to renegotiate for new rates with our clients with whom there are already two to three-year contracts in force," he said when contacted yesterday.

On Wednesday, Dr Subramaniam said the pay increase for security guards in the private sector would be implemented on July

He had said their salaries would go up by between 67% and 75% and the take-home pay would be in the range of RM1,100 to RM1.450.

Shaheen said the association, which has

400 members, was concerned whether the Government would increase its budget for security services as a result of the increase.

He said there was also worry whether the private sector would cut back on security services.

"The move would result in 250 to 300 companies going out of business," he said.

Dr Subramaniam, meanwhile, said the Government would study the association's request for a postponement.

Speaking to reporters at ExxonMobil Safety erated that the RM1,100 to RM1,450 figure was the takehome pay that included over-

time and allowances.

Malavsian Employers Federation Shamsuddin Bardan executive director said employers were relieved that the minimum wage that was gazetted recently was between RM500 and RM700, depending on which state the secutiry guard company

He said the amount was a compromise figure based on recommendations by employers and workers' union to the Wages Council.
