The chairman of the then newlyminted Federation of Malaya Industrial & Commercial Employers' Consultative


Association, I.P. Bruce of oil company Shell, described the association's objective in his address to

the group:

"The path towards progress and development along which the Federation of Malaya has chosen to travel is that of a private enterprise economy operating within the policy laid down by a democratically elected Government.... It is only right that the Government should expect the interests of employers to be represented by a recognised and far-reaching association, and that it should be able to turn to that body for advice and consultation on all matters pertaining to the functioning of the free enterprise system." Over the years, the association has expanded and changed names – it is now the Malaysian Employers Federation (MEF) – but its original objective remains the same: to be a body that people can turn to for information on doing business and working in Malaysia.

In line with-this, the MÉF recently published Collective Bargaining & Collective Agreements: The Law And Practice, the



10th book in its series on specialised subjects relating to industrial law. This comprehensive and informative book is a manual employers can use in ensuring collective agreement discussions are done correctly; it is also a rule book for trade unions as well as a handbook on rights for employees.

Aimed at those involved in the field of industrial relations and human resources management, the book
